

The President's Report


The North Sydney District Cricket Club (NSDCC or the Bears) took enormous strides forward in the 2016-17 season. Whilst the Bears missed out on the finals we recorded a massive 125% improvement in our win ratio across all grades. Our 386 point improvement in the Club Championship was far and away the best improvement of any club in the competition. A repeat of this feat in the 2017-18 season would place the Bears in the top 8. First grade (15th on 36 points) was only 12 points shy of a finals berth and rued three close losses to 4th placed Penrith (by 17 runs), 16th placed St.George (by 11 runs) and 5th placed Bankstown (by 7 runs). Those 35 runs were the difference between 15th place and 4th place on the ladder and demonstrate just how fine the margins are in this sport. Our 3rd grade (10th on 43 points) were also 12 points shy of a finals berth and look certain to be finals contenders next season. I am delighted with the direction of our onfield performances as they reflect the valuable contributions that have been off the field.

When I commenced the role as President my first agenda item was to reach out to our juniors President Karl Riseborough to to discuss how we could better work together in advancing cricket in our region. Our community is blessed with a large pool of keen young cricketers who I hope can develop into our Premier Grade players of the future. I am delighted with the progress that we have made with the help of our supporters in nurturing a more integrated community. In 2016-17 we successfully launched the Friday Night Bear's Squad at Bon Andrews Oval and leveraged the excellent canteen facilities at the newly renovated Cunningham Pavilion. Some of our most talented

senior cricketers also undertook coaching assignments with our junior teams and I am sure this has led to an improvement in our junior cricket skills and game enjoyment. We aim to make these programs bigger and better in 2017-18.

We are truly fortunate to have many sponsors, volunteers, service providers and other supporters who have stepped up to assist your Committee in ensuring we can continue to provide high quality cricketing opportunities for our members. I wish to acknowledge and thank Cricket NSW and the Sydney Cricket Association for their support during the season. They remain our major source of funding however their support extends well beyond financial assistance.

I mentioned in last year's annual report that Cricket Australia and Cricket NSW unveiled plans for the Club Accreditation Scheme or CAS as a means to improving the grass roots of Australian cricket. The CAS has been a useful tool in guiding your committee towards structural improvements in the set-up of NSDCC. The Committee continues to learn and is consistently improving our CAS score which indicates that we are on the right path.

Another imperitive for the Bears was to broaden our fundraising initiaves to improve our funding self sufficiency. Premier Grade clubs require significant association (CA, SCA and CNSW) financial support through the various grants programs however these sums are nowhere near enough to meet the not insignificant costs of fieldling our seven teams. The financial accounts demonstrate that the Bears did a much better job in raising funds this season and have a better platform from which to expand. I wish to thank the many volunteers who have made this possible and none more so that our Treasurer, First Grade Official Scorer and Club Person of the Year Robyn Wilson who put in more combined hours than anyone this season. I extend my thanks and praise to your Committee who have volunteered their time to ensure that the Bears continue to improve. The Bears have a talented and diverse Committee who juggle their professional work responsibilities, Committee roles and in many instances playing duties to selflessly contribute to the good management of the Bears. I encourage those members who wish to contribute to the improvement of our club to put themselves forward for nomination. We can only get stronger through more members contributing to our success.

The other major initiative of the 2016-17 season was the commencement of an alliance with Shires club Roseville. The alliance concept is designed to ensure both Roseville and North Sydney can attract and retain talented cricketers within our combined geographical catchment area. Our alliance was launched at a combined pre-season training event and communication was maintained between our respective selectors throughout the season. Our first steps have been modest and we will look to build on these steps in the coming seasons.

Financially the 2016-17 audited accounts show a deficit of \$16,792 and cash at bank balance of \$24,085. The financial result was disappointing and was almost entirely accountable in the \$15,727 increase in cost of ground and net hire to \$42,566 (\$26,839 in 2015-16). Running a Premier grade club is an expensive endeavour and raising funds to keep teams on ovals is a never ending exercise. The Bears cannot afford to be complacent in our fundraising efforts in the coming seasons.

I extend my sincere thanks to our sponsors without whom we could not function. David Hill and his team at Raine & Horne Crows Nest have been loyal supporters of the Bears and we are proud to wear his brand on our



apparel from our under 9s through to our 1st Grade. Likewise Patrick Gallagher and his team at the Union Hotel, North Sydney have been generous hosts for many of our functions and game day de-briefs and his ongoing financial support is most appreciated. We have been fortunate to attract a new sponsor this season in the Diggers on the Central Coast thanks to Stephen Byfield, and we are thankful for Harry Solomons continuing support at Kingsgrove Sports.

One of the most exciting developments this years was the completion of the redevelopment and refurbishment of the Cunningham Pavilion at Bon Andrews Oval. The redevelopment included the much anticipated storage facilities. The change rooms and canteen facilities are first class and it is little wonder that the Bears community are gravitating to this facility as our de facto 'home'.

The Bears are fortunate also to have the excellent services of the North Sydney Council grounds staff who have provided high quality practice and playing fields for our teams over the course of the season. Peter Devlin at the St Leonards Park precinct and Bernie Vince at Tunks Park have provided high quality facilities and worked constructively with us to ensure a smooth season.

We eagerly anticipate the proposed turf net facility upgrade in St. Leonards Park adjacent to Bon Andrews

which will ensure the Bears have access to the very best outdoor facilities in the Sydney Premier Cricket competition. Our longer term goal is to secure an indoor facility on the lower North Shore and we will continue to draw upon the expertise of Cricket NSW in this endeavour.

In addition to the works at St. Leonards Park I am optimistic that Tunks Park No.1 will gain a picket fence in the near future. I have participated in discussions with council and residents regarding the proposed developments at Tunk Park and have registered our safety concerns on game day. A fence will provide the appropriate demarcation to mitigate any unfortunate ball strike to a casual user of the park whilst games are being played.

I extend my thanks to Justin Avendano our 1st grade captain. His team's season was injury affected with opening bowler's James Campbell and Ollie Knight succumbing to season ending injuries very early in the season. Justin himself also battled injuries but worked hard to be fit enough to compete and justifiably earned his call up to the NSW Futures League.

I congratulate our 2016-17 1st grade debutants Ben Bryant, Ryan Van Kemenade and Declan Hoare and wish them all the best in their 1st grade careers. There was definitely a sense of stability around the make up of our top grade this year that translated into greater consistency in performance.

Much of our onfield success can be attributed to our Head Coach Jason Krejza who took over the role during the pre-season and stamped his professionalism on our set-up. Jason worked closely with our 1st and 2nd grade teams in particular and both showed good improvement this season. Jason also made himself available for selection when injuries impacted on player availability making handy contributions with both bat and ball. My thanks also to former New Zealand international

cricketer Ian Butler who fine tuned our fast bowling skills during pre-season. The Bears have developed a strong relationship with Ian and we welcome his continuing support.

Last season I announced the President's Scholarship Award initiative which I have continued in 2016-17. The President's Scholarship Award is a monetary award to those members who achieve NSW State cricket representative caps. The Scholarship is an acknowledgement that our high achievers are often unable to commit to part time and casual work whilst they are studying due to the intense time commitments

required at the elite cricket level. The President's Scholarship Award is a small contribution from the Bears in acknowledgement of these sacrifices made and our way of thanking those players for making that sacrifice. This year's Award has again been sponsored by me personally.

I am proud to announce that our Award winners in 2016-17 are:

- Justin Avendano (NSW Futures League); and
- Will Graham (NSW Schoolboys)

I anticipate that given the depth of our junior talent pool that the President's Scholarship Award winners will become an even greater alumni which can only be a good thing for the Bears. I wish Aidan Thomas and Tim Reynolds all the best in their quest for state honours later this year.

On a final note as President I think it is important for the Bears to find ways to give back to our community. Last season the NSDCC supported Mr. Hobbs a sun bear who resides at Taronga Zoo. Mr Hobbs was rescued from a Cambodian restaurant and our small contribution has helped Taronga zoo look after Mr Hobbs this past year. If you visit Taronga zoo, please visit Mr Hobbs and feel proud that your club is putting something back into our broader community.

Highlights

Whilst none of our Premier grade teams made the finals in 2016-17 the club made great strides forwards with encouraging results. Across all senior teams we scored 1,418 more runs and conceded 458 less runs. We lost 17 fewer wickets and took 69 more wickets which translated into a 125% win ratio improvement and a massive 386 extra Club Championship points, the best improved of any Premier Club this season. Our 1st and 3rd grades were an agonising two wins away from the finals. In the case of our 1st grade that translates to a mere 18 runs across the entire season. We have every reason to be optimistic in 2017-18.

Our Club is getting stronger and there remains a strong sense of optimism at the Bears based on our rapidly maturing junior talent. 33 of our youngest Bears represented their districts in junior representative cricket teams (up from 19 in 2015-16) and this provides an encouraging foundation for future years. As mentioned in President's Report the Bears had four NSW age group representatives and we have high hopes that this representation will expand with the junior talent that our coaching staff are nurturing.




















Head Coach's Report

North Sydney T20 team 2016-17

AW Green Shield Coach's Report



Although the 2016/17 season was slightly disappointing one for North Sydney there were plenty of positives to enjoy. With many talented players in their last year after having had plenty of experience at this level, there were hopes that we would be able to consistently put big runs on the board. Unfortunately, we didn't manage to score runs consistently enough when it mattered, and on one or two occasions didn't hold our nerve well enough with the ball to trouble the top sides.

We did manage to record two thumping bonus points wins, one over Fairfield-Liverpool and one over Sydney University, both as a result of bowling first and dismissing the opposition cheaply. A washout in the first round against a weak Western Suburbs sides and a loss in a rain-shortened game against rivals Gordon made the task of qualifying for finals very difficult.

There were several positives to focus on, however. In his last year, Dhruva Thorat was incredibly consistent on his way to 147 runs at 36.5, while under 15s player Jonno Aylward managed 10 wickets at an average of 17.2 (including 4/17 to skittle Fairfield-Liverpool at Tunks Oval). Ben Knox's 7 wickets at 24 barely did justice to how well he bowled over the course of the season and the emergence of Aidan Thomas as an under 14s player was incredibly encouraging as well.

The Bears further developed the Canberra connection that emerged last year, hosting Josh Low-McMahon and Jay Allen for the season, both of whom represented the ACT under 15s the previous season. Josh is a tremendously talented keeper-batsmen, and Jay is a spinning all-rounder who is tremendous in the field. Both were great additions to the team and it is hoped that the senior club will see them in the future if they ever decide to ply their trade in Sydney.

Overall, a 13th place finish was respectable without reflecting the talent present in the squad. Several of 2016-17 cohort are available for the 2017-18 campaign, and preparations are already underway. Many of the lads have already found their way into the grade ranks and contributed towards wins in many different grades over the season as well. All in all, there is much to be positive about.

Junior Section President's Report

The 2016 / 17 Season was a continuation of growth and success for the Junior division, and this is the result of a fantastic support structure behind it. There are a number of factors that have determined this, but the main drivers have been: the huge demand in the Lower North Shore for junior cricket; a dedicated and enthusiastic Junior Committee; and continued interaction and alignment to the NSDCC, through the Committee and seniors players.

The Junior Club end of year presentation was held on the grounds at Bon Andrews, North Sydney's No. 2 oval. It was a beautiful sunny afternoon, and holding the presentation at this location represented a focal point for our Club. Speaking with many parents over the season, having a place to call our home is important to a Club, and this year has started to see Bon Andrews become that venue for us. This started with the Friday Night Squad training sessions, the brainchild of David Graham. These sessions allowed junior players to train with some of the seniors, and parents could socialise at the Clubhouse. This concept was well received by the participants and will continue into next year with some exciting developments.

Alignment between the Seniors and the Juniors sections has never been better. Many of the junior players now know a number of grade players thanks to their participation in the Friday Night Squad training – this is a significant advance in our integration strategy. The

juniors wear the same uniform and identify themselves with the Senior division now. Communication is solid, with continuous interaction between David Graham and myself. When opportunities arise, consideration is for both sections and both sections are not siloed anymore. This is a great place for the wider Club to be. The juniors should be, and will be, the main feeder of players into the grade cricket teams.

The North Sydney District Junior Cricket Club supports skills based or game formats for children starting from 4 years of age, all the way up to grade cricket. This applies now for both boys and girls for the first time a we start to have female players approaching adulthood. We are one of NSW's largest Milo centres and from feedback received, one of the most organised. This year saw a good number of new children starting with the Club. Overall, numbers slightly increased by 4%, but it was girls cricket that saw the biggest increase rising 160% in participation in the T20 Blast Girls only format and the Girls U13/17 Competition. Female players make up approximately 20% of registrations now — an increase from 10% last year.

Girls Cricket has again flourished this season with two Under 17's teams and one Under 13's team playing. The skill level has developed significantly, clearly demonstrated when the Under 13's won their division in the Spring league. This was a fantastic achievement and the team were very proud to receive their 'baggy

black' cap at the presentation day. The growth in girls cricket has been phenomenal and this is expected to continue. As a Club, we have a number of girls playing representative cricket for the North Shore Junior Cricket Association as well as in the Brewers Shield Competition and NSW Academy. We are a Club of choice for girls cricket and Jenny Riseborough is the North Shore Junior Cricket Association Female Cricket Coordinator, liaising directly with the North Shore Junior Cricket Association and Cricket NSW.

Milo cricket is our entry level for children to start their cricket journey. This season saw healthy numbers register. The T20 Blast program is a fantastic transition from Milo to Under 9 'whites' cricket, giving the children opportunity to play games in a fun environment. From Under 9 to Under 17 formats, we had 25 teams register. Skill level is improving, thanks to the dedication of our parent coaches and enthusiasm from the players. This resulted in some notable achievements and success within the Club:

Junior cricket is almost a victim of its own success

with a shortage of grounds being a new issue that the North Shore Junior Cricket Association has had to face this season. One remedy was to reduce the number of longer format games in some age groups, implementing a shorter 20 over format, allowing two games to be played on a ground on the Saturday morning and also Saturday afternoon. One consequence which has been emphasised is the disparity of skill level in comparative teams of other clubs. Most clubs are now grading their players, so in order to align our Club and to make our teams competitive, potentially this is a route we could take next season for certain age groups.

Another challenge faced by our players this year were

the weather conditions. Following the summer break, only two or three games were able to be played given extreme heat or wet conditions. This was frustrating for all involved, and unfortunately, not something in our control. The frustration shown however, demonstrates the level of enthusiasm in our players and desire to play. Again, the North Sydney Junior Cricket Club has seen another year of huge support by committed parents. Their efforts in coaching, team management, serving on the Committee or coordination of the Milo and T20 Blast formats, make our Club what it is - community driven. In an effort to develop this culture, we have seen a second hand gear exchange commence, thanks to David Hill, both a parent of one of our players, as well as our major sponsor. We have also contributed to the Caribbean Cricket Charity, a fantastic initiative to support kids in the Caribbean start their cricketing pathway with at least some basic equipment. Pink Stumps Day was another big success this year with many teams participating in showing support and raising funds for the McGrath Foundation. Next year, we look to use social media more effectively to better the communication to our players. We also hope to see a ladies social cricket league start up, targeting some of those cricket enthusiast Mum's of our Junior players.

It is an exciting time in junior cricket and the Junior Committee consider to be part of this both an honour and rewarding. Watching how our juniors aspire to their heroes is truly great to watch and with the development of the Big Bash franchise in addition to ODI and Test cricket, we continue to experience wider youth engagement. And that is fantastic.
