- Provide higher quality facilities by working constructively with local council, the State government and Cricket NSW to prioritise resources;
- Expand our training, development and playing programs to engage a broader universe of cricketers including schools and girls/ women's cricket; and
- Strengthen our community engagement.

President's Report Rob Lavery

2018/19 was a year of significant development and change for the UTS NSDCC Bears. On field, results were improved from previous seasons, particularly in our men's first grade side. Off the field, the club has established a structure to ensure fiscal and playing strength into the future.

On the field

UTS North Sydney finished 12th in the NSW Premier Cricket club championship in 2018/19. First grade made the quarter finals of the one day competitions and stormed into third place by the end of the main competition. Rain ensured the team progressed to the semi-final, whereupon rain also scuppered the team's chances of progressing further.

Third and fourth grade made strong, albeit ultimately unsuccessful, tilts at the top six after slow starts to the season. Unfortunately the performances of the AW Green Shield and Podevin-Gray sides were not quite as strong.

Of great import in 2018/19 was the commencement of UTS North Sydney's women's cricket program. On December 2, the U18 Brewer Shield team took to the field against Sydney. The girls become the first women's team to represent this club in our 125-year history, and the first to represent the North Sydney area in senior competition in over 35 years. Coach Michelle Goszko led a young squad which developed remarkably over the course of the season.

Major partnership

2018/19 saw the North Sydney District Cricket Club enter into a partnership with UTS. This partnership is a major benefit for the club, providing significant funding and scholarship opportunities, as well as access to resources and administrative support, that will allow the Bears to challenge the top clubs in the NSW Premier Cricket and Sydney Women's Premier Cricket competitions.



Financial support and sponsorships

UTS North Sydney retained major sponsor Access RnD as well as The Union Hotel and Hartford Partners in 2018/19 to help maintain the financial stability of the club. As well as this, UTS North Sydney acquired a media partner, The Brand Bar, as well as retaining a website partner, NgageCMS, to help promote the club professionally.

The club has received significant grant support from Cricket NSW, the Australian Cricketers Association, local and state government in 2018/19. Much of this support has been to improve infrastructure, such as sightscreens and net facilities, as well as to financially support the launch of our women's cricket program.

Without the support of our partners, it would not be possible for our players to take the field and we are enormously grateful to all our sponsors and financial supporters.

Coaching structure

2018/19 saw UTS North Sydney take significant steps in improving the coaching structure for our players. In the men's section, head coach, Jason Krejza, was now supported by two assistants with significant representative experience, Adam and James Crosthwaite. Oliver Knight took the reins as Green Shield coach and Todd Harper joined the club as training co-ordinator.

The Bears' women's Brewer Shield side was coached by another former Australian representative, Michelle Goszko. Michelle is one of the most respected junior women's coaches in Sydney and proved a major asset for UTS North Sydney's players, as well as the club.

Junior pathways

UTS North Sydney worked to strengthen the pathways for local juniors, as well as UTS students, to represent the club at NSW Premier Cricket and Sydney Women's Premier Cricket level. Junior 7s tournaments, as well as regular midweek squad coaching for the North Sydney juniors, and provision of team coaches, ensures our club and players are visible to, and engaged with, those aspirational junior cricketers in North Sydney.

Administration

2018/19 saw the departure of long term President, David Graham, as well as the Treasurer, Philippa Graham. Both contributed significantly to the club over the past 3 and a half, and one year, respectively. This change has presented the opportunity for the club to engage new committee members, in Glenn Aitken and Sarah Berman, and establish long-term club members, in myself and Adam Wayling, in officebearing roles.

Volunteers

Club volunteers come in many forms, from the committee, to those who provide match-day management and support, to parents and families of players, as well as selectors, coaches and former players. The volunteer work undertaken by players themselves is also not to be forgotten. Great thanks to all those who contributed during the season.

James and Adam were appointed assistant coaches while Sam and Matt were in charge of bowling left handed, having luscious curly hair and providing a lot of the banter for the year. There was one more inclusion in pre-season by the name of Todd Harper. He might not have played but he was instrumental in the team and club moving forward.

A special mention must go to Thomas Jagot. Jages was appointed as captain a few weeks out from round one due to an injury. That win was the 1st of 10 in a row. We couldn't be stopped.

A few memorable highlights of the year:

Thomas Jagot and Adam Crosthwaite's record 260 run partnership to chase down Sydney's mammoth total of 383. I've never seen a batting display like it. Jages went to another level scoring 125* and getting himself into the illustrious 200 club. (200 balls). Adam once again showed why he is the best batsman in Sydney scoring 143*.

It was a positive season for the UTS North Sydney District Cricket Club Second XI. The team played a high standard of cricket throughout the year. The season consisted of 15 matches, resulting in six strong wins on the first innings, one draw and eight losses. A reasonably balanced tally of results. Unfortunately the side finished in 14th position, underperforming considering the developing talent available.

Twenty eight players represented the club in second grade during the season. The side consisted mainly of

young players, but there was a sprinkling of experience which resulted in an ideal environment where a team could expect to give a good account of itself. The second grade side, when at full strength was equal to the best sides in the competition. The narrow loss against, eventual premieres Sydney University, was a reflection of this.

The talent and skills on show in second grade is best verified by the amount of significant milestones achieved. Many players joined the ranks of the Austin Punch and the Victor Emery Club. Moreover, five different players scored hundreds and two took five wicket hauls this season.

The selectors focused on giving opportunity to the youth of the club and the season saw the development and improvement of many players. Adam Docos, Adam Wigglesworth and particularly Bennett Walsh and Ali Shaikh took their opportunities and realised some of their potential. I hope this continues through to next season.

The debuts of Sam Alexander, Jake Hardy and James Leary were also impressive. Each demonstrating great maturity and determination. Their efforts were match winning and they are players of great promise. I look forward to seeing them take their opportunity to play higher honours in future years.

Additionally, Oliver Knight, Sam Alexander, Declan Hoare, Tim Reynolds, Jake Hardy and Will Graham were rewarded with promotions to First Grade due to their results. This speaks of the type of cricket that was a feature of many second grade matches.

The season was very enjoyable and it was a pleasure to captain the second grade team. All members of the side were genuine, focused and gave their best efforts. James Leary continued his strong early season form with 47.

The Bears returned to winning ways vs Mosman chasing down 259 on the back of a superb knock of 70* from Rafay Shirazi. However threes were unable to gain any momentum with a soft loss to Sydney at Birchgrove followed by a draw against the eventual premiers, Easts, where the weather ,and a brilliant Jake Lintott celebrity knock of 93* bailed the side out.

The side returned from Christmas revitalised and kicked things off with a strong win against Parramatta on the back of a gutsy 100* from David Barber and a disciplined bowling performance. The Bears then lost two thrillers, going down by a run against Manly in round 10 and a wicket against NDs in round 11.

Ultimately these two losses would prove crucial in the wash up, as the Bears hauled themselves into finals contention, winning Round 12 comfortably vs UNSW, then recording back-to-back outright victories vs Wests and Campbelltown.

This left threes needing a win in the last game of the season at home vs Bankstown. Sadly Bankstown played the better cricket and prevailed comfortably. The boys showed Great Spirit throughout the season and we can look ahead to season 2019/20 with optimism.


Fifth Grade Report Fudge Atshan
