At a Special General Meeting on 28 November 2023, the members also ratified changes to the club constitution. The changes were recommended by the management committee and sought to update the Constitution to reflect the club's women's section, which was not envisaged when the Constitution was drafted and most recently updated. The Management Committee also identified a number of other areas where updates would be beneficial to reflect modern administration (such as the presence of online banking, online meetings and minutes and accounts being kept electronically rather than in hard copy).

The club was delighted to grant Life Membership to Rob Lavery. Rob has served the club with great distinction as a player and in a number of administrative roles including President. Rob's recent contributions to the women's program have been immense and he is a truly outstanding recipient of this honour.

The club continues to be committed to adhere to the following key principles:

- Transparency in our decision making;
- Accountability for our responsibilities;
- Democracy in decision making with committee members afforded the opportunity to test issues with rigorous debate; and the
- Financial sustainability of our club.

I am pleased to report that the committee has adhered to these key principles. As a committee we continue to strive to improve both our processes and our outcomes. The ultimate goal of this work is to ensure the players have every opportunity to succeed when they take the field.

W2s won the flag at the first time of asking after being successfully admitted into the competition as a standalone side the same season, while it was the club's first Poidevin Gray Shield since 1985, ending a nearly 40-year drought.

The Premierships were both won on 10 March 2024, which will become a storied day in the club's history. It is a particularly proud moment to win these premierships in such highly competitive competitions which have been wonderfully curated by the SCA and Cricket NSW.

On the field

The 2023/24 season was an amazing success for our women's program with all three grades playing finals and Second Grade winning the Grand Final vs Gordon.

NSDCC's 51st Life Member

Rob Lavery



The Management Committee of the UTS North Sydney District Cricket Club unanimously agreed to recommend to the members that Mr Robert Lavery be confirmed as the clubs 51st Life Member.

Rob joined the Bears in 2011/12 at the tail end of a period of sustained success for the club. Rob started out in 4th Grade but quickly demonstrated his wares and ultimately moved up to 2nd Grade.

At his peak, Rob was a formidable opening bowler. Possessing height, a smooth run-up and an action that reminded me of Jason Gillespie, he was good value for his 32 wickets at 28 in Second Grade.

Rob's playing statistics for the Bears read 132 wickets at 22.11 with a best bowling of 5/28 and 391 runs at 9.53 with a top score of 38. The majority of those wickets came as a seamer, with a few more recently sprinkled in as on off-break bowler. It distresses me that Rob's batting average is superior to my own, something I intend on correcting next season. That Rob has skippered every grade from Second to Fifth pays testament to his maturity, leadership and tactical acumen.

As impressive as Rob's on-field achievements are, his nomination for Life Membership is also as a result of his off-field contribution, which has been immense. Rob has had two stints on the Committee -one brief stay shortly after joining, and the current tenure, which commenced in 2016/17 and remains ongoing as Senior Vice President. Rob stepped into the breach as President at the commencement of season 2018/19 when the elected President resigned at short notice. Rob has been a selector, coach, website operator, writer, President for three seasons, Senior Vice President, essentially Director of Women's Cricket and captain at various times, all whilst juggling a young family and a second job that actually paid him.

During Rob's time as President, the club strengthened in all aspects. We were stronger on the field - indeed the club's results in the Men's Club Championship improved with each year of his Presidency. The club's financial position improved. The club's standing in the community improved. The Women's program continued to grow. Volunteer engagement improved. By all measures, the Lavery years as President were some of the strongest in the club's history.



Rob has also dedicated significant time and effort into our burgeoning women's program. With the significant support of some other key individuals, this program has evolved into a three-team program with the approval of a standalone Second Grade team being the most recent achievement.

Although Rob has not been the only individual to contribute to the growth of the women's program, without his involvement, it would not be in the position it is today. Rob's calm leadership piloted the program through some choppy recent waters. I know Rob is proud of where the program is placed, as well he ought to be.

Rob loves cricket and I have greatly enjoyed our chats about the sport, the club and our own performances over the years. I'm sure it is Rob's love for cricket that

has driven his truly massive involvement in UTS NSDCC.





After a long wait from their semi-final victory over Randy Petes, the young Bears side met a strong Northern District side in the Grand Final, fresh off a First Grade Limited Overs Premiership.

The Bears lost the toss on a flat-looking deck at Allan Border Oval and were asked to field first. The Bears got off to a good start thanks to Sherriff's great building of pressure before Fergusson struck with a slight edge through to Moore. Despite the positive start, the Bears were still on edge as the opposing captain, Shaw, joined Tunks to build a robust firstwicket partnership. The pair looked comfortable on a pitch, providing less and less for pace bowling, forcing skipper Hedges to throw the ball to his spinners to earn back the momentum. The NDs batters tried to attack Desai and Oxenham, bringing about wickets as Desai beat Shaw through the air to have him stumped swiftly by Moore for 38. Soon after Desai took his second key wicket, a sharp caught and bowled to remove Miller, who was fresh off a firstgrade century the day before.

Tunks and Crayn then came together to take momentum away from the Bears again, with boundaries beginning to flow. A change in the bowling finally brought on Harry Gardner, who waited no time to impact the game. Gardner took the wickets of both set batters in consecutive overs thanks to a series of sharp catches by Johnson before waiting no time to spin another through the gate of the new batsmen. With wickets having fallen quickly, the Bears restricted the run rate well into the final powerplay before 3 more wickets fell to Gardner as the ND's middle and lower order failed to clear the ropes in the dying overs. Gardner finished with a brilliant 6/26 (which later earned him the player of the match award) to restrict NDs to 196.

After finishing on the back of one Englishman, another stepped up to start the Bears run chase off brilliantly. Sykes took to NDs' bowling attack, striking 11 boundaries in the opening session, including 3 maximums. The fast start gave the Bears significant momentum into the run chase; however, quick wickets of Sykes (60 of 42) and Moore soon after (20) brought NDs back into the fight.



Netto joined Sherriff at the crease with 105 still left to win. The pair absorbed the pressure of the NDs' spinners and gradually began to take the game away from their opponents. Sherriff played the anchor role (32) as Netto (66) aggressively chased down the total, striking 4 sixes. The two comfortably brought home the match for North Sydney with 7 wickets in hand, ending the 39-year drought and giving the Bears their second ever PGs victory.

Women's Second Grade Premiership

Sophia Mavros



After an extraordinary run of seven successive wins, including a thrilling semi-final victory over Sydney, we come to Chatswood to meet a Gordon team seeking revenge after we beat them a fortnight earlier.

But there is something different about the two teams meeting today. Gordon is a team that now fears us and our bowling strike power, and we don't just believe but know that we can win from any position. We win the toss and put them in, and it is immediately apparent that they have come prepared with a new game plan. Taking quick infield singles and slashing hard at width, the Gordon openers roll the dice in an attempt to rattle us.

It works initially, as they score at 5 runs per over for the first 5 overs. But then, Aurora Mavros jags one back off the seam to trap Bhanage in front, Eva Jenns tempts run-machine Callaghan into spooning up an easy catch, and Aurora Mavros knicks off their bighitter Mitchell caught-behind to have Gordon reeling at 3 for 39. When Sophia Mavros spins a couple of absolute peaches past Salmon and Johnston, and Emily Aitken has Moriarty caught at slip to a lovely catch from Kayla Robson, Gordon are just about done at 6/54.

But finals have a funny way of exploding expectations. Gordon keeper Kotibhaskar combines with Yates to put on a determined 65-run partnership that threatens to push Gordon's score well above the 150 mark. With the score at 119, Kotibhaskar looks to hit Sophia Mavros over the top. With the ball arcing high towards the boundary, mid-on fielder Aurora Mayros gives chase, turning and running at full sprint and finally taking a superb over-the-shoulder catch with extended arms. From that moment onwards, the Gordon batting innings is a spent force, with Emily Aitken and Alex Mayros cleaning up the 3 remaining wickets for only three additional runs. Gordon is bowled out for 122 in 39.1 overs, two runs less than their innings a fortnight prior. Another fantastic effort from our superb bowling unit!



Running true to the script for this season, we begin the chase poorly, losing 2 for 12 before skipper Sophia Mavros comes in to steady the ship with a defensive stand. When she goes with the score on 3/61 and half the score still to get, Alex Mavros again hurts Gordon with a half-century, taking us close before she is dismissed. Aurora Mavros again remains not out to steer the team to victory under enormous pressure, with the Bears knocking off the total in the 44th over. As the team sits in their circle on the grass, reflecting on achieving the best possible result for our first year in Second Grade, all coaches and players could not be prouder of each other's efforts, passion and commitment. No one but ourselves believed we could do it, and that was all it took!

Nic Bills 500 First Grade Wickets

In the final match of First Grade's T20 campaign, our captain, Nic Bills, took his 500th wicket in the top grade in NSW Premier Cricket.



Nic made his First Grade debut for the Bears in November 2009 aged 17, earning cap number 615. He became a mainstay of the side in 2010/11 and took 47 wickets in 16 matches at 15.83, including his career best figures of 6/17. This made an irrepressible case for higher honours. Nic played his only Sheffield Shield match in March 2011, bowling first change and removing a pair of future internationals in Marcus Harris and Nathan Coulter-Nile.



Nic remained at the Bears until the end of the 2013-14 season. He left for Manly at the age of 22 after an astonishing 172 First Grade wickets in just over five seasons, and having been a key member of the squad which won the First Grade Limited Overs Cup in 2012/13. In the same season, he and James Campbell combined to put on 156 against Bankstown, setting the club's record partnership for the tenth wicket, with Nic making his career best score of 96* at number 10. This record made Nic a shoo-in for the club's Team of the Decade when it was selected in 2020.



Before returning to the Bears for 2023/24, Nic spent the prior seven years at Sydney, returning five 40+ wicket seasons, of which three involved 50+ wickets, and holding coaching and selector roles. We're thrilled to have him return to where it all began and share his experience and leadership qualities with the playing group.

Nic's 500th First Grade wicket was his tenth of the season in five T20 matches, and his 182nd for North Sydney at an average of 19.50. He becomes the 54th player in the long history of NSW Premier Cricket to reach the illustrious 500 milestone.

Congratulations, Nic, and we look forward to celebrating many more milestones!

First Grade Report

Nic Bills

Looking back on the First Grade season, it was one of change, a few missed opportunities, some outstanding individual and team performances and an incredibly impressive potential to achieve our goal of winning first grade competitions in the next 2-3 seasons.



Across the entirety of the season, the win loss record was not in our favour, but this does not show for the growth in a number of our players, which included 10 new players to the list of first graders to the Bears throughout the season. The most exciting part of the new players (plus the young players already at the Bears) was the fact that when we asked them to pull on their First Grade cap for the first time, they were well and truly ready for the call up. No challenge we asked of them was too much and the fact they were able to more than compete at First Grade level, means the club is in a great position moving forward, to capitalise on the strength of our playing group.



Our season was highlighted by three strong wins:

- Against Manly at Manly, where we were able to chase down 250+ against a side who would be eventual Belvidere Cup runners up.
- A two-day win against Gordon, eventual finalists in the Belvidere Cup, at Bon Andrews which saw contributions from nearly every player in the side in a game that came down to just 17 runs.
- Finally, a one-day win against Western Suburbs, eventual finalists in the Limited Overs Cup, which saw Tim Reynolds get his first, first grade hundred in a remarkable run chase (with a little luck on our side) which saw us chase down the 288 set by Wests in their innings.



These wins highlight the exciting and incredible potential of this young group moving forward, which will no doubt include many more great wins like this in the years to come.



On behalf of all the players, we would like to make a few special thank yous to people, without whom we would not be able to do what we do on Saturdays and Sundays. To Sarah and Kathy, for all your efforts off the field, scoring, organising lunch and teas and everything else you do without us even knowing, no task was ever too big or too small and without all of your efforts we would be lost.

Poidevin-Gray Shield Report

The 2023/24 UTS North Sydney Poidevin-Gray Shield campaign was a historic one with the young Bears winning it all taking out the shield in a famous win vs Northern District at Allan Border Oval.



The structure of the competition was altered by the SCA from the previous two 50-over matches and four T20 fixtures to five 50-over matches. The Bears entered the season confidently with a side stacked with representative players, albeit younger players with U20 Nihal Desai being the elder statesman of the team. This confidence was well placed after they clinically disposed of the NSW Country U19 squad in a trial match at Tunks Park.



Round 1 saw the Bears travel to Waverley Oval to play Easts. As became custom, the Bears bowled first seeking to utilise their dangerous fast bowlers (Hedges, Sherriff, Reynolds and Fergusson) before deploying the spinners (Oxenham, Desai and Gardner) in the middle overs. The plan worked adequately with

Easts bowled out for 211 in 48 overs with Addison Sherriff the pick of the bowlers with 3/24 off 9 overs.

In response James Moore (34) and Addison Sherriff (50) batted with aplomb after the loss of two early wickets. Hamish Reynolds then showed his class with 65 off 68 and the Bears wrapped up the chase with 2.5 overs to go at 6/212.

In Round 2 the Bears were on the road again, this time travelling to Hurstville Oval to clash with the Saints. This match followed a familiar to pattern to Round 1. The Bears bowled first, restricted St George to 175 off 43.2 overs and then chased it home comfortably for the loss of 2 wickets. The wickets were spread amongst the 7 bowling options at the disposal of skipper Hedges, and Moore (68*) and Sherriff (69*) steered the chase maturely.



The Bears were home in Round 3 vs UNSW, and for the third time on the bounce they were asked to bowl first. It should come as no surprise that this potent Bears attack was too much for the Bumblebees restricting them to 182 off 45 overs. Skipper Hedges was the pick of the bowlers with 4/27 off 8 overs. The Bears ran the chase down easily in 28.3 overs for the loss of 4 wickets, claiming the bonus point. Netto (33), Moore (41), Sherriff (34*) and Reynolds (48 off 35) were the key contributors with the bat.

The Bears won the toss in Round 4 vs Manly and elected to field and the formula continued to work a treat with the Bears bundling out Manly for 202 in the last over with wickets spread around. Addison Sherriff was the pick of the bowlers with 3/30 off his 10 overs with all 3 wickets clean bowled to total seeds. Unfortunately, the Bears misfired in the chase, with some complacency creeping into some of the shot making. Would this be the loss the young Bears would have to have? Only time would tell.



Tunks Park was the scene for the Round 5 clash vs Randwick Petersham. The Bears knew a win would likely guarantee them a home final and they came out firing in a rain affected start reducing RPs to 3/18 early. RPs recovered to 3-70 before a brilliant Fergus Fergusson direct hit removed the dangerous Coady. When Gardner dismissed the set Egan for 50 off a rank long hop, the Bears sensed it would be their day and they duly rolled Petes for 151 in the 45th over.

The chase wasn't all smooth sailing with some cavalier strokeplay reducing the Bears to 4/96, however Addison Sherriff (50*) played an extremely mature innings to anchor the chase and see the Bears home in the 36th over with the loss of 5 wickets. The Bears were finals bound!

The Conference Semi Final saw the young Bears pitted against local rivals Gordon at North Sydney Oval.

Gordon won the toss and elected to bat, which the Bears were more than happy to oblige.

Gordon got off to a decent start at 2/84 before the Bears spinners took hold of the contest. Oxenham had Kennedy stumped, Gardner bowled McLean and Oxenham sharply ran out Booth and the match was changed – Gordon now 5/90. The spinners ended up sharing 6 wickets between them with Oxenham the pick with 3/22 off 8.3. Fergus Fergusson was the top seamer with 3/36 off his 10 overs as the Stags were dismissed for 175 in the 47th over.



The Bears chase got off to a hot start with Harrison Allomes (20 off 11) starting brightly. However, the middle order didn't fire and we were in trouble at 5/104, although run rate was not an issue. Skipper Hedges (38 off 38) and debutant Dylan Johnson (39* off 43) played a gem of a partnership, delivering the Bears the victory in the 33rd over. Both men played with maturity, running hard between the wickets and punishing the loose ball. It was especially pleasing to see Third Grader Johnson play so confidently against regular First Graders Cook and Toohey in the Gordon attack.



Unfortunately for Johnson, the returning Netto took his place in the Conference Final vs Randwick Petersham at North Sydney Oval. Again, the Bears were asked to field first (for the 7th time this season!). And again, the Bears bowlers delivered, ripping through the Petes top order and reducing them to 5/26. Reynolds and Fergusson took 2 each with Sherriff jagging one pole. Coady, who batted well against the Bears in the Round 5 clash, took up the fight with a counter-punching 91, but he was ultimately dismissed by Harry Gardner, caught Oxenham, with the score on 7/149. RPs continued to compete bravely, batting out their 50 overs and ending 9/207.



A respectable crowd was in place to watch the Bears' chase and they were treated to one of the better innings from a North Sydney player in recent memory. Troubled by a sore back, Englishman Ollie Sykes threw caution to the wind with a whirlwind 79 off 42 balls that included 5 fours and 9 sixes. All told, 74 of his 79 runs came from boundaries!! Sykes was dismissed with the score on 3/118 and, following this, the Bears lost Sherriff and Reynolds to be in a spot of bother at 5/40 albeit only needing 2.4 an over due to Sykes' earlier blitzkrieg. Netto (37 off 29) repaid the faith of the selectors, partnering with skipper Hedges (33) for a crucial 62 run stand for the 6th wicket that saw the Bears to safety in the 32nd over.



This commanding win would mean the Bears would take part in their first Poidevin-Gray Shield final since the 2020-21 season in attempt to win the shield for the first time since 1984-85 season! Our opponents would be the class of the Thunder Conference — Northern District, who boasted a number of current and former Aus-19 representatives. Unfortunately, North Sydney Oval was unavailable, but Allan Border Oval in nearby Mosman hosted the Grand Final.

Amazingly, the Bears again bowled first – the 8th time in succession and clearly now a lucky charm, with NDs skipper Shaw electing to bat. Fergusson got his obligatory early wicket, dismissing Hook for 7, caught behind by Moore. Tunks and Shaw looked dangerous advancing the score to 1/65 in the 15th over, before Desai landed the killer blow in the fixture, with an expertly landed wrong-un, fooling Shaw. He was stumped cleanly by Moore for a run-a-ball 38.



Desai then removed Australia under 19 representative Miller (fresh off a brilliant ton in First Grade vs the Bears) with another wrong-un, this time a brilliant caught and bowled for 13. This brought the dangerous Crayn to the crease, who looked like he could take the game away until he was undone by Gardner, caught safely on the boundary by Johnson. Johnson was back in the side for the unlucky Hamish Reynolds, who missed due to injury.

From here it was the Harry Gardner show as he ripped NDs apart with a match winning 6/26 off 9 overs. He had the set batsman Tunks (51) caught in the deep (again by Johnson), skittled overseas pro Baker, fooled White in the flight to be caught off a leading edge by Hedges, and then had Apps and Anderson caught in the deep by Desai and Johnson (his third catch). This spell would see him awarded the Shane Lee Medal for Player of the Match. Fergusson then bumped out Fullagar and the Bears had dismissed the much-vaunted Rangers batting line up for an under par 196.



Having successfully chased down six totals during the season, the Bears were confident of completing the task and delivering the club its first silverware since the 2020/21 5th Grade Premiership.

In an innings similar to his display vs Randwick in the Conference Final, Ollie Sykes was belligerent as he took apart the NDs attack. He scored 60 off 42 balls

pasting 8 fours and 3 maximums as he got the Bears off to the perfect start. When he was dismissed in the 17th over the score was 2/88 and run rate was a very manageable 3.2 an over.



Sykes had set the platform for the Bears middle order and they didn't disappoint, chasing the total down in the 38th over for the loss of 3 wickets. Addison Sherriff (32* off 52) and Jordan Netto (66* off 71) batted superbly for the fourth wicket, putting on 105. Sherriff played maturely as always, hitting the gaps and rotating the strike. Netto was outstanding versus his old club, with his stroke-making all around the ground the highlight. He was particularly harsh against spin and never gave NDs a chance.



It was fitting that the Bears won the Premiership with such a clinical display against such quality opposition. It was a truly dominant display of limited overs cricket. Credit must go to coach, John Saint, and his assistant, Tim Reynolds, who facilitated a style of cricket that suited the group and fostered a positive dressing room. Jamieson Hedges skippered the team with maturity and played two critical innings in the conference semi and final. His calm leadership was crucial to the team's success.

Addison Sherriff, who is still an U18 player, was the player of the season with 310 runs at 77.5 and 9 wickets at 23. He was also the leading run scorer. Addison's batting in the middle order often steered the team home to victory with his calm temperament critical. He also chimed in with crucial wickets when require by his skipper. Harry Gardner was the leading wicket taker with 14 poles at 11.36 highlighted by his match winning performance in the Grand Final. Fergusson (12 @ 18.17), Reynolds (10 @ 23.6), Oxenham (10 @ 24.1), Hedges (9 @ 15.78) and Desai (9 @ 24.78) all chipped in with vital wickets.



Special mention must also go to Ollie Sykes for his two match winning knocks in the Conference Final and Grand Final. Both innings showcased his immense ball striking talent, which has been topped off by him being recently awarded a contract with Surrey. Moore (271 @ 38.71), Netto (160 @ 40.00), Reynolds (160 @ 26.67) and Hedges (124 @ 31.00) all made telling contributions with the bat during the season.



Premierships are not easy to win. Indeed, this one broke a 38-year drought. Congratulations must go to the players and coaches on climbing the mountain and delivering premiership success to the club!
