# **President's Report**

#### **Ash Perrott**

Season 2024/25 was a challenging one for the clubs results overall, but the standout performance was by our Women's 2nd Grade in winning the Premiership, successfully retaining the title after the team's success the prior season. This is an incredible achievement in any sport or competition, and especially so in the increasingly competitive and growing environment within women's cricket. The club also made finals in three other competitions – Men's Third Grade and Poidevin Gray, and Women's Third Grade. Congratulations to everyone involved with these teams on your achievement over the season.

There were also a number of great individual performances across the Club over the season, with numerous centuries and 5 wicket hauls to celebrate. Undoubtedly the standout among those was an incredible 207 not out by Finn Nixon-Tomko in a Men's Second Grade one day game versus Gordon at Bon Andrews Oval, which put him into the club record books as the sixth-highest Second Grade score in the club's history. An incredible achievement given it was a one-day game!

We had a total of 51 players make their debut with the club this season, 38 in men's and 13 in the women's, so that was fantastic to welcome all those new players into our community.

#### On the Field

Looking at the men's season overall, it was a generally disappointing year with results across most grades not as we would have liked and a finish of 16<sup>th</sup> in the Club Championship. However, as mentioned above, the one exception to this was Third Grade where we

finished fourth in the regular season and then progressed to the semi-finals, only to be thwarted by rain against the eventual Premiers, and unable to push for progression through to the Grand Final. Congratulations to Liam Whitaker who skippered the side with great skill and passion, and the rest of the team on a great effort and campaign. There were some amazing individual highlights towards the end of the season as they stormed up the table and into the finals by winning their last five games, two0 of them being outright victories.

Our 2023/24 Poidevin Gray Premiership winning team unfortunately bowed out in the quarter finals in their title defence, but again put in some excellent performances over the season.

I want to thank all our grade team captains, Mac Jenkins, Callum Hill, Liam Whitaker, Robin Broom and Alex MacGill for their leadership and efforts over the season. Thanks also to Ryan Sood for all his effort in leading the AW Green Shield team over the season.

Thanks must also go to our men's coaching panel for their effort across the season, led by Nic Bills, and well supported by Angelo Joseph, Liam Whitaker, Tim Reynolds and Dylan Marshall, along with Lachlan Dodd from UTS Sport.

Turning to the women's competitions, as stated above, our Women's 2nd Grade team successfully defended their Premiership title in season 2024/25. This was an outstanding achievement given a number of player changes from the prior season, so congratulations to all the team members. A huge thanks and congratulations to Bella Johnson who led the team, and had an amazing individual contribution across the season, culminating in winning the Bevan Whyte Cricketer of the Year award for the Club. I must also congratulate our Third Grade team on making semi-

finals once again, just falling short of making it to the Grand Final, and thank Bernie Robson for leading the team so well over the year. Thanks also to Varada Vinay who led our U18 Brewer Shield team over the season as they performed well and finished just a couple of wins outside the finals.

A big thanks to everyone involved in our women's program, especially our coaching group of Michelle Gozsko, Rob Aitken and Petar Sredojevic for their dedication at training and on match days to prepare the girls for success.

The opportunity to participate in our wonderful sport would not be possible without the efforts of the Sydney Cricket Association (SCA) and Cricket NSW in arranging and managing the respective competitions, and we thank them for their hard work.

#### **Partners**

The Bears once again continued the highly valued partnership with UTS this past season. The support from UTS is key to our operating as a successful sporting entity and we thank Sam, Dale, Lachlan and all of the team at UTS Sport.


Everyone coming together with a shared love of cricket, from varied and diverse backgrounds, to form a wonderful community, is what makes it so much more than just a game.





### **Women's Second Grade Premiership**

After a nail-biting semi-final win over Bankstown, the UTS North Sydney Women's Second Grade side returned to their home deck at Tunks Park for Grand Final, ready to take on Parramatta in what would become a commanding display of cricket.



Parramatta won the toss and elected to bat first—much to the Bears' delight. Familiar with the Tunks surface, the home side knew the pitch would give them something to work with in the first hour. And just three balls into the match, Emily Horstead sent off stump on its way, removing Parramatta's opener for a golden duck. From there, it was all UTS North Sydney.



After three tight overs to start, Lavena Rampal struck, dismissing the second opener and sparking a collapse. The pressure mounted quickly, and in the

10th over, Lavena delivered a match-defining moment—taking two wickets in three balls to leave Parramatta reeling at 4/22. Sam Kuncham then joined the party, collecting two wickets of her own and pushing the score to a dire 6/41 for the visitors.

The spinners soon entered the scene and continued the onslaught. Emily Aiken was exceptional, picking up two wickets while conceding just 4 runs in a miserly spell. She was followed immediately by Miki Jenkins, who snagged the 9th wicket to keep the squeeze on. Lavena came back to polish things off in style, finishing with standout figures of 4/10 off 6.3 overs. Parramatta were bowled out for just 69. The bowlers were superb across the board, backed up by sharp and committed fielding.



With just 70 to win, the Bears were full of confidence heading into the lunch break, enjoying a spread kindly provided by the club. Opening the chase were Emily Aiken and Bella Johnson, who got off to a steady start before Emily was dismissed in the 4th over with the score at 1/10. That brought Emily Horstead to the crease, reuniting the dynamic duo of Bella and Emily, who once again showcased their trademark composure and chemistry. Faced with some tricky, slow bowling, boundaries were hard to come by, but the pair remained patient and smart—rotating the

strike, running well between the wickets, and picking off twos and quick singles to keep the scoreboard ticking.



At drinks, North Sydney were in control at 1-48. The tempo lifted after the break, and in the 25th over, it was Emily Horstead who struck the winning runs, sealing a back-to-back premiership for UTS North Sydney! Bella Johnson anchored the innings with a calm and classy 38 not out, while Horstead finished unbeaten on 22. Player of the Match was rightly awarded to Lavena Rampal for her stunning 4-wicket haul in a Grand Final to remember. It was a dominant performance from start to finish, the UTS North Sydney Second Grade women proved once again why they are the benchmark of the competition. Back-to-back champs!

### Bernie Vince - 20th Lower Grades Ground of the Year Award

Bernie started with North Sydney Council in 2000 at Bon Andrews, where he picked up three Lower Grades Ground of the Year awards, before moving to Tunks after the 2003-04 season. At the ground which has been his home ever since, he's won the award another 17 times and placed second in the other four seasons. Really, Cricket NSW should just name the award after him!



UTS North Sydney is blessed with some of the finest and best-kept grounds in Sydney, thanks to the North Sydney Council team, but Bernie truly goes above and beyond his paid role. On a Tunks matchday, he will not only be the first to arrive, but also the last to leave. We don't need to worry about who will get chairs and tables out or repaint the creases during the innings break, because Bernie will be onto it before anyone else even thinks about it. It's all part of the exemplary service.

Bernie bought into the Bears from the start, and has followed us through many ups and downs, but his love for and loyalty to the club doesn't stop him providing the best possible hospitality to umpires and visiting teams too. It's hard to think of anyone more universally respected across NSW Premier Cricket.

Over 25 years, of course the game and the club have evolved, including more short-form cricket, live streaming and the establishment and growth of our

women's section. Bernie's embraced all of this, and has cheerfully added storing and charging the Frogbox to his long list of weekly tasks! He's been a passionate supporter of our women from inception with one team at the bottom of the table to the powerhouse we are today – a powerhouse which needs more matchdays and more time from Bernie at Tunks.

We were very proud to host the 2024-25 Women's Second Grade Grand Final at Tunks Park and retain the trophy on Bernie's hallowed turf. We couldn't get the smile off his face from the moment the first Parramatta wicket fell!

At the halfway mark in the off-season, all the Bears are looking forward to getting back on the park for 2025/26, and we're sure none more than Bernie. Can't wait to do it all again from September, and who would bet against a 21st award?!

# **Robbie Aitken - CNSW Distinguished Service Award**

In March this year, Cricket NSW announced the inaugural winners of its Distinguished Service Awards, honouring 43 volunteers who have made significant contributions to cricket for more than 25 years. One of the 43, and indeed the first on the alphabetical list, was our own Robbie Aitken. In Robbie's case, the award recognises well over 30 years as a player, coach of our women's teams, and advocate of the game amongst everyone he crosses paths with. We are so fortunate that Robbie is a Bear, and congratulate him on this immensely well-deserved award.

We share below Robbie's nomination for the award, compiled and submitted by Club Secretary, Sarah Berman.



Robbie has played First Grade cricket for over 30 years, with his most recent appearance at the top grade a year ago at the age of 48. He is the only player in history to have played over 500 matches at Premier Cricket First Grade level in Australia. He played in the NSW U19 and U21 sides before earning a NSW 2nd XI selection. He has won the Bill O'Reilly Medal for the best player in Sydney Grade Cricket and the Michael Bevan medal for player of the one-day final. He has been a premiership player at the club, played in numerous finals matches, and scored over 11.000 runs and taken over 600 wickets in First

Grade. However, there's a lot more to Robbie than the extraordinary numbers.

What won't turn up in the record books is the grace with which Robbie carries himself in all elements of life at the Bears. There is not a player, volunteer or club supporter Robbie won't chat to. He'll celebrate a ball well bowled in the nets whether it is delivered by a First Grader or the newest of Green Shield players. He will also brightly commentate a well struck drive if you're foolish enough to feed him a straight half-volley. Robbie's humility makes the club environment more pleasant to be around and his wisdom is available to anyone who wants to ask. He has also been an active clubman, helping lead the team when required and going above and beyond to help get the club in the press.

Robbie is always generous with his time. In the last couple of years when no longer being selected regularly for First Grade, Robbie has committed himself fully to playing at Second Grade level, including several matches as captain, and mentoring talented young players coming through that grade.

In recent years, Robbie has also been a key member of the coaching team for our women's squad, of which both his daughters are members. He does this on a voluntary basis, committing time to Wednesday evening training and Sunday matches, on top of his own Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday commitments.



In this role, Robbie has shared his knowledge with many young players, many of whom are playing NSW pathways cricket, and always done so with a smile and imparting the importance of enjoying the game.

Robbie is an extraordinary role model for young cricketers of achievement, longevity and enjoyment of the game. This would be the case just looking at his

In Memoriam

#### **Evan Miller**

Tragically the club has lost Evan Miller, who passed away aged 37 in early August 2024 after a stint in Prince of Wales Hospital. Evan came to the Bears early in 2005 after finishing school in Port Macquarie and taking part in a NSW Combined High Schools Cricket tour of South Africa.

Evan commenced his grade career in 2s at the tail end of 2004/05 season. Encouraging performances saw him start the following season in 2s as an off-spin bowler and middle order bat. After a career high score of 151, the all-rounder was promoted to 1s, earning cap number 591 and becoming a regular fixture over 5 seasons.

immense career on the pitch, but his active giving of his time to anyone he shares a net or pitch with amplifies it several times over.

I can say with confidence there are scores of UTS North Sydney players, male and female, who have been inspired by Robbie to work hard and keep playing the game.

Robbie's humility means he is not overly comfortable with press attention (so perhaps he won't love me for this!), but he has always been willing to be featured in the press when asked, in order to promote the Bears and the game. This applied in particular to when he reached the 500 First Grade appearances milestone, with coverage in the Sydney Morning Herald, The Australian, The Daily Telegraph, the Fox Sports website and the Grade Cricketer podcast

His batting and fielding continued to impress and in 2005/06, at the age of 19, the athletic sportsman scored a century (101\*) at North Sydney Oval when he guided the team to a bonus point win chasing a score of 280 in a 50-over fixture. He became the second 19-year-old batsman from Norths to score a First Grade

century that year after the feat not having been achieved for over 26 years. He went on to score over 1,750 runs in 1s with two centuries and seven 50s.

Evan's other career highlights included a memorable 50-over match against Randy Petes. Norths were in deep trouble at 5/59 and 2 batsmen retired hurt. Evan's standout innings of 82 enabled a total that was still less than par. Usman Khawaja then put Petes in the ascendency before Evan claimed his wicket and finished with 4/32 off his 10 overs to win the game despite the Bears being two bowlers short.

Evan also claimed the wicket of Phil Jacques when he scored 321 against the Bears, falling just short of the SCA record score, and he played in our most recent Second Grade premiership-winning side in 2010/11. Evan loved the club and its people and was a tremendously popular figure on and off the pitch. He worked very hard at his cricket before other commitments took over, with his last appearance for the Bears being in 2011/12.

Evan was a larger-than-life personality (which is hard for someone standing at 196cm tall!) and will be missed by all who played with him.

#### **Anthony Dignan**

After playing Green Shield with Gordon and then in the top two grades with Manly, Digs was First Grade Cap 536 and a key figure in North Sydney's First Grade side from 1993/94 to 2001/02. Known for his powerful hard-hitting middle-order batting and wicketkeeping, he led with courage and never took a backward step. His teammates won't forget his devastating 160 against Penrith in First Grade at Howell Oval.

Off the field, Digs was a great Bear, well known for his spirit, humour, and fun he brought to the sheds and off the field. Our heartfelt condolences go out to his family, friends, and all who knew him. We will provide funeral details once we have them.

Paul came from Leicester where he played club cricket and also had a stint in the Central Lancashire League with Oldham in the late 70s. ### **First Grade Report**

#### Sarah Berman

As is often the case, the ladder position of 16<sup>th</sup> does not do justice to a young side who went toe-to-toe with perennial performers Northern District and Manly and eventual Grand Finalists Fairfield-Liverpool in the closing stages of the season.

But before I get to the end, I should start at the beginning, with the Kingsgrove Sports T2O Cup. Historically, T2O has not been the Bears' format, but this season that certainly changed, as we came flying out of the blocks. We opened our account with wins against university rivals Sydney University and then UNSW under lights at North Sydney Oval, burgled one against Blacktown thanks to an amazing 20th over from Tim Reynolds (4, nb+6, dot, 6 when we needed 21 to win) and destroyed Wests after James Campbell dismissed Josh Philippe second ball, putting us undefeated, top of the group and full of confidence.



We unfortunately didn't make finals day on home soil after a tough loss to Bankstown, but nonetheless we'd started the season superbly. Mac Jenkins was in red hot form with the ball after 12 poles at 13, and Jimmy Greenslade, Tim Reynolds and James Moore had all shone with the bat.



Our first two rounds in the Belvidere Cup were thrillers, as we lost to Gordon by 5 runs and then squeaked past Penrith by 2 wickets as Jamieson Hedges held his nerve, the see-saw setting the tone for the season to come. The Gordon result was one of several tight losses where things could easily have gone the other way and our ladder position would have looked quite different. A prime example is Round 13 against Northern District, which also doubled as Old Bears' Day with several old faithfuls in the Mollie Dive bar. Set 297 to win, the Bears were 5/166, but Jimmy Greenslade refused to give up and smashed six sixes on his way to 82 before being last man out caught on the rope just 12 short of the target. And the following weekend, Jamieson Hedges put in a phenomenal performance to take 6/70 to come agonisingly close to beating Manly.



Our four wins were the nailbiter against Penrith, a DLS thriller against Sydney where we'd have lost but for a Mac Jenkins wicket with the last ball before the rain came, a tight chase against Mosman iced by Harri Lee-Young after a James Campbell masterclass, and a thrashing of Sutherland inspired by Hedges' second successive five-wicket haul. All of them involved Bears standing up to be counted, and the run of spirited performances after Christmas showed us what this group is capable of.

Individually, there were a number of highlights:

- Tim Reynolds' phenomenal season until his knee gave way in Dubbo, which cemented his standing as a lynchpin of our middle-order, highlighted by 140\* in our 350 against Hawkesbury.
- Jamieson Hedges' breakthrough season in First Grade with 24 wickets at 21 and an extraordinary run in the second half of the season where he was the clear stand-out.

- Another superb season for Addison Sherriff, after his Australia U19s call-up, including hundreds against both Grand Finallists.
- Maiden tons at the top grade for James Moore and Adam Thomas (in only his second First Grade appearance).
- Three 80+ scores from Jimmy Greenslade at the back-end of the season, including an imperious 120 against Sutherland.
- Mac Jenkins' combined 40 wickets across the two competitions, enough to see him take out the Access Grants Bradman Medal for the player of the year for the second successive season.

So, there's plenty to be cheerful about — onwards and upwards for 2025/26!

# **Women's Second Grade Report**

The batting just kept getting the job done.



Once again, the W2 Bears bowling unit was a force to be reckoned with. By the season's end, there were four of our bowlers in the top ten for the whole competition and all with a bowling average just sneaking in double figures. Well done to Emily Aitken, Emily Horstead, Lavena Rampal and Bella Johnson who dominated with the ball. In fact, we could have had six of the top ten if Sam Kuncham had not battled injury or had Varada Vinay played more Second Grade games instead of leading the Brewer Shield team.

However, bowlers are only as good as their wicket keepers and fielders. We were fortunate to have three excellent wicket keepers, in the form of Lily Hancock, Kayla Robson and Maanasa Jaganath. This did prove to be a double-edged sword, as sharing keeping duties did not allow for uninterrupted time behind the stumps. For those of you who are departing, we thank you for your valued contributions and we hope you call the Bears your home once again when we are granted the pathway to First Grade that you have worked so hard for and repeatedly demonstrated that you deserve. A heartbreaking 2 wicket loss to easts followed and then a solid victory vs Hawksbury. Dilraj Singh's 62 was the highlight vs Easts and Robin Brooms 75 was the best vs the Hawks.

From here the 3s season unravelled, an outright defeat to Parra, then a thrashing at the hands of UNSW were compounded by unfortunate washouts to Sydney (18th) and Blacktown (20th). We then lost our two T2Os to Wests and Sydney Uni and went to Christmas with 2 wins from 11 and the season seemingly over.

UNSW posted a competitive 5-161 off their 20 overs, and the Bears were in all sorts of trouble at 4/29 off 7 overs. Hedges and Thomas took the score to 4/79 in the 13th over, but when Hedges was dismissed, we were all at sea needing nearly 12 an over for victory. However, Thomas took the Bees' attack apart, hitting with immense power including three consecutive sixes to see the Bears home with three balls remaining. He finished with 76\* off 40 balls and was well

supported by Dylan Johnson (22 off 14) and Everett Oxenham (24\* off 8).



In the second game of the day at Blacktown
International Sports Park, Thomas went even bigger,
smoking the Uni bowlers for 84 off 34 rocks. He hit
5 fours and 7 sixes in one the cleanest displays of
ball striking seen... since his Surrey team-mate Ollie
Sykes's blistering innings in the Semi and Grand
Final in the previous season. Jordan Netto (54\* off
33) was also hugely impressive as the Bears posted
3-196 off their 20. Uni were never in the hunt,
particularly after Hedges took 2 wickets and a run
out in the first over!

Unfortunately, Round 6 vs Blacktown was washed out and Round 7 saw the Bears out-pointed by Manly going down by 64 runs after bowling the Tahs out for 180 at Manly Oval thanks to 5/22 by skipper Hedges. The Bears therefore needed to beat Easts to have any chance of making the finals. We were sent in down at Tunks and posted a very competitive 9/265. Thomas (69 off 89), Addison Sherriff (70 of 74) and Netto (35 off 24) were the pick of the batters. The Dolphins couldn't get going, with Harry Gardner 4 for 31 off 9 the pick of the bowlers as Easts were bowled out for 179 in the 43<sup>rd</sup> over.

The Bears were back in the finals albeit as the lowest ranked side and would have to play top seed Parramatta at Old Kings in the Quarter Final.



Unfortunately, the Bears couldn't replicate the magic of the prior season, even after restricting Parra to 206 off their 50 overs. We were bowled out in the 39th over for 147 with Moore (47 off 53) and Dyland Johnson (25\* off 43) showing some fight. Parra's Ryan Gupta was too good on the day with his 6/31 off 10 and he was the difference between the two teams.

Thanks to Nic Bills and Harrison Ward for coaching the team and credit must go to Jamieson Hedges for his cool leadership of this talented squad. James Moore (252 @ 50.4) and Adam Thomas (240 @ 60.0) were the pick of the batters. Harry Gardner was the best of the bowlers with 15 wickets at 14.33. Jamieson Hedges with 9 @ 20.11 was also dangerous with the new ball. Congratulations to Adam Thomas who won the Player of the Season.

Sam Williams showed exactly what she's capable of, taking apart the Ghosts' bowling attack not once, but twice with a commanding 53 in the second match. Stepping up with composure and intent, Sam took it upon herself to lead the way with this innings.



Varada Vinay, our captain at the start of the season, made an immediate impact with both bat and ball her performances so strong they demanded Second Grade selection. Leading from the front throughout the campaign, her standout moment came in the form of a commanding 89 against Parramatta at Bon Andrews - a true batting exhibition that set the standard for those around her.



Not to be outshone, Lana Sredojevic produced a bowling performance for the ages in that very match, rising to the occasion in support of her captain. Her extraordinary 7-wicket haul - the first ever in our women's club history and the third-best in Brewers' history- was something truly special to witness. She finished the season with 21 wickets at an astonishing average of 10.19, capping off what was a breakout year.

## **AW Green Shield Report**

Season 2024/25 saw 12 new Bears join returning players Toby Hannan, Amodh Sriram and Rayyan Kazmi in a quest for the Green Shield Premiership. The squad was coached by Tim Reynolds with support from former Greenies players Lachie Barber and Luke Austin. Ryan Sood was selected to skipper the side from behind the stumps, and a pair of Central Coast players in Vincent Thornley and George Verth joined the squad as the two country players.



In Round 1 the Bears hosted Sydney University at Tunks. The Bears won the toss and elected to field. Uni scored 6/235 off their 50 overs which was a good score in the large Tunks ground. Amodh Sriram was the pick of the bowlers with 3/20 off 9 overs, and spin pair of Rayyan Kazmi (1/40 off 10) and Zayan Choorapulakkal (1/32 off 8) were economical going at four an over. To chase down 235 batting second at Tunks, the young Bears would have to be at their best. Kaviru Karunaratne (64 off 88) and Jacob Hanlon (26 off 28) have the Bears a fighting chance at 6-167.
